Ward Stone to speak at dinner

Most of us read or hear about West Nile virus, Lyme disease and White-Nose Syndrome in bats in the news. But Dr. Ward Stone, featured speaker at the upcoming annual chapter dinner, deals with these and other diseases involving wildlife daily. A NYS wildlife pathologist for 40 years and head of the DEC's Wildlife Pathology Unit, Dr. Stone is a leading expert on the effects of pollutants, toxins and pathogens on wildlife and humans. Combining field and laboratory work, his studies have ranged from the effects industrial wastes such as mercury and PCBs on the environment to the rise in illness and death from West Nile virus. He is also a passionate and outspoken advocate for the environment,

Innings and Outings

How do I sign up for a hike?

For further details or to sign up for a hike, call the trip leader. Try to call at least two days in advance, as leaders may cancel on the day before an outing if there is insufficient interest. Leaders reserve the right to refuse participants for any reason, including lack of experience and/or lack of physical fitness. All equipment and supplies are the sole responsibility of the trip participants.

What do I need to bring?

The trip leader will let you know if any special equipment (crampons, snowshoes, etc.) will be needed. In general, you should always carry food, water, rain gear, map, compass, headlamp, first aid kit and extra clothing, including hat and gloves in case temperatures drop. Clothing for wet or cold weather should not be made of cotton — use a synthetic fleece or wool. If in doubt, ask the leader.

What if I don't have snowshoes/crampons?

The chapter has hi-tech snowshoes and one pair of universal fit crampons available for rental at \$5/trip. Contact Stan Stoklosa at 383-3066 to arrange for pick up from his convenient location in Clifton Park. Gear is also available to rent at local retailers..

Should I reimburse drivers for gas?

Yes! Each rider should pay their driver four to five cents per mile, depending on the current cost of gasoline. With gas at \$2 per gallon, four cents per mile should be used and at \$2.50 per gallon, five cents should be used (\$3/gallon – six cents, etc).

The kind of hikes I'd like to do aren't listed here — what can I do?

Trip leaders may be willing to plan trips based on member suggestions. If there's a specific trip you'd like to do, contact Herb Terns at 372-8478 and let him know.

Spruce Mountain, which lies to the west of Hadley Mountain, has beautiful open meadows along its summit, as well as great vistas east to Hadley and south and west to Lens Lake, Middle Flow and Livingston Lake. Last October, the chapter held an enjoyable hike to Spruce Mountain from the north, beginning on private land and following informal paths. This year, we'll try to bushwhack to the top from the west, crossing state land from Middle Flow. There may be some steep climbing and perhaps a ledge or two to negotiate. Distance is about 5 miles, with about 1100 ft of climb.

Despite a rainy forecast, we proceeded to the trailhead and were treated to mostly blue skies with some lingering fog at the top partially obscuring the well view. We took the north trail from Keene at a leisurely pace. Dogs (well behaved) almost outnumbered humans on the trail today. Canoe Trip – Axton Landing to Raquette Falls – 7/19/09

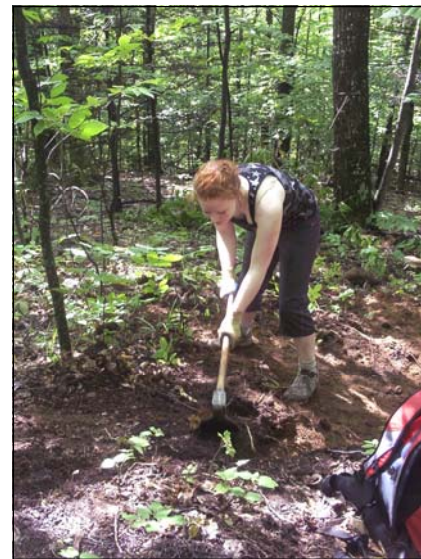
